The Board of Directors of The Postharvest Education Foundation presents the award to an outstanding graduate e-learner or a team of e-learners after the successful completion of a year of training on commodity systems assessment, small-scale postharvest handling practices, postharvest demonstration design, postharvest training program design, and cost/benefit analysis.

Roseline has been a member of the WorldVeg team since 2014. She is active in organizing and conducting postharvest research experiments; organizing on-station and on-farm training on postharvest handling, storage and processing of vegetables crops; organizing and conducting outreach and promotional activities such as field days to promote the development and adoption of improved postharvest practices; conducting surveys and other field evaluation exercises; and producing reports and promotional materials.



Her postharvest training activities for more than 800 participants have included construction of the Zero Energy Cool Chamber (ZECC) and solar drying of vegetables.
